CRITERION I – CURRICULAR ASPECTS

1.1 – Curriculum Planning and Implementation

1.1.1 – Institution has the mechanism for well planned curriculum delivery and documentation. Explain in 500

To deliver the curriculum effectively to the students, Vijaygarh Jyotish Ray College has adopted following mechanisms- 1. In departmental meetings at the start of the academic session syllabus is distributed among the teachers. 2. Class load is assigned to each teacher in departmental meeting considering the requirement as per the prescribed CBCS in UG and PG courses. 3. Weekly routine and academic calendar are prepared by the college routine committee comprising teachers from every department under the supervision of the Principal for each year /semester for both UG and PG classes. 4. Teachers prepare their individual academic plan in consultation with departmental heads and other colleagues for each year/Semester considering the allotted syllabus and available classes in a session. Every teacher submit their academic plan to the Principal. 5. College administration continuously monitors to ensure adherence of class schedule by teachers and students. 6. Remedial and tutorial classes are arranged by departments as and when required. 7. Students participate in project work and dissertations under the supervision of respective departmental teachers. 8. Field works, Educational excursions and summer internships are offered by various departments. 9. In practical classes, students are provided with proper instrumentation facilities. 10. To evaluate academic improvement of students, apart from conducting Internal Assessment Test before each semester examination, class tests are also conducted by the departments on regular basis. 11. Detailed records of classes, student attendance and assessment, project reports and examination results are maintained by the departments. Meetings of the academic committee are held time-to time to analyse these records and to generate suggestions for student improvement. 12. For effective dissemination of knowledge in the classroom, traditional chalk-and-talk teaching methodology is seamlessly blended with technologies involving presentation software, animations and lecture videos through LCD Projectors. Students participate in Google classroom of departmental teachers for assignments, quizzes and e-resources. 13. Well prepared study materials are provided by the teachers to the students, especially to the slow learners. 14. Upon guidance of departmental teachers, students regularly participate in intra as well as intercollege debate, quiz and science model competitions. 15. Students are often encouraged to participate in group discussions by the departmental teachers after completion of a particular topic. 16. Advanced learners are motivated to present papers in seminars (ranging from institutional to national level) and write articles in various journals. 17. Respective subject experts from various outside institutes are regularly invited to deliver seminars and special lectures in order to impart latest knowledge-base to the students. 18. Principal, along with IQAC, conducts intercollege faculty development programs regarding ICT enabled teaching learning methodologies. 19. Teachers regularly participate in state, national and international level seminars/workshops/symposiums/short-term courses for their academic enrichment in order to impart newer knowledge to the students. 20. There is a rich central library as well as departmental libraries with a good collection of text and reference books as per the prescribed syllabus for student benefit. The college provides INFLIBNET facility for e-journals and ebooks to cater the needs of the teachers and students since 2017.

1.4.2 – How the feedback obtained is being analyzed and utilized for overall development of the institution? (maximum 500 words)

Feedback Obtained

A written feedback form was constructed for both students and teachers keeping in mind several curricular and cocurricular key aspects. The assessment questionnaire included various questions about teachers as well as office, library, canteen, laboratory etc. These forms were distributed among the departments and both UG and PG students were asked to give their feedback on a scale of 1 to 10, without revealing their identity in anyway. The teachers have also given their feedback in a selfappraisal format on the same questions. Departments organize Parent Teacher Meetings (PTMs) timetotime. Parents present in those meetings provide feedback regarding academics and infrastructural facilities of the college from their own viewpoints. For future developments of the college, suggestions and comments provided by the guardians are taken into consideration. After collecting the forms from the students, the average and percentage values of each criteria were calculated and the results were summarized. After discussing with various administrative committees and

departments, strong and weak points were identified, proposals were made to take necessary steps for best implementation of our strengths and improvements in our weaknesses.

2.3.2 – Students mentoring system available in the institution? Give details. (maximum 500 words)

For the last few years a system of mentoring, namely tutorward system is in practice in the college, wherein academic development and psychological wellbeing of a group of students was looked after by a teacher or tutor. In this system, teachers were also assigned with the duty of monitoring class attendance and performance of the respective group of students they are dealing with. The present mentormentee system is the restructured form of the previous tutorward system. In the present mentoring system, all the fulltime teachers of the college are involved with students (i.e. mentee) of each class as mentors. In case the number of students in a class is in the higher side, more than one full time teacher is assigned the duty of mentorship. A list mentioning names of mentors for each class are well circulated among students in the classroom as well as displayed in the departmental and general notice boards of the college by the college administration before start of a session. The list is also published in the college website. Duties of the mentors include keeping track of mentees regarding their academic progression and psychological wellbeing. Mentees with below average class attendance are given special attention, so that reasons of their absence in classes can be known and they can be encouraged to be present in classes on regular basis. Primary psychological counselling is also provided by the mentors to the mentees in need. Sometimes, a few mentees with deep psychological problems are referred to professional counsellors, if need be. Orientation programs are arranged by the mentors for his/her mentees at the onset of an academic session. In these programs, the past and present of the college are briefed to the mentees. Vision and mission of the institution are discussed with the mentees in detail as well. They are also made aware of the available facilities and rules and regulations of the college along with the regulations of the affiliating university. Demographic details of the mentees encompassing their educational background and socioeconomic status are also recorded by the mentors maintaining confidentiality. Formal as well as informal ways of mentoring are used by the mentors. A few of the teachers are trained in soft skill development techniques from different workshops, which is helpful for helping the mentees in need. The mentor system helps to upgrade inclusiveness, gender sensitivity and social responsibility of students.

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2.5.2 - Reforms initiated on Continuous Internal Evaluation(CIE) system at the institutional level (250 words)

Projectbased evaluation method has been introduced in the arts and social science streams as per instruction of the affiliating university for the newly

implemented semesterwise Choice Based Credit System. 10 marks in each Honours and Pass papers have been assigned for student attendance as prescribed by the affiliating university in each stream of arts, science, social science and commerce. The system of including marks obtained by students in class tests in the final result is also executed as suggested by the affiliating university. For evaluating students of the General courses, MCQ based question pattern has been adopted. The administration is considering implementation of online class tests through Google forms in Google Classroom platform as preliminary report regarding this matter is showing high level of interest among students to participate in such tests.

2.5.3 – Academic calendar prepared and adhered for conduct of Examination and other related matters (250 words)

Academic advisory committee of the college comprising the departmental heads and presided by the Principal, prepares an elaborate academic calendar well before commencement of the next academic session. This academic calendar is distributed to the students during their admission in the college. It is also published in the college website. Students are explained about the academic calendar during the orientation programs. The academic calendar is also given to all the teaching and nonteaching staff of the college by the college administration with the instruction of adherence to the calendar as far as possible. Yearly schedule of the college mentioning the list of holidays (national, state, local and institutional), date schedule of the college internal examinations along with tentative date of publication of results and university examinations, are published in the academic calendar. Information regarding schedule of Parentteacher meeting, College social and other cultural programmes, College sports etc are also provided in the academic calendar.

7.2.1 – Describe at least two institutional best practices

1. CULTIVATING A DEEP SENSE OF SOCIAL COMMITMENT GOAL: The development of a personality, we believe, does not merely rest on one's academic excellence. It has to be supplemented by activities, other than and complementary to academics. A socially embedded self has to be produced, a self that will be perpetually alert to and sensitized toward the social reality that surrounds us. CONTEXT: With this in view, our college undertakes elaborate and extended programmes implemented through a welloiled unit of the N.S.S. NCC The unit is particularly oriented to realize its commitment to the neighbourhood - its ecology, its people, various disadvantaged groups. THE PRACTICE: This is carried out through outcampus and incampus activities. Cleanliness, literacy programmes are such outdoor activities. The unit organises a host of incampus events in the form of different sensitization programmes, such as the gender sensitization programme. The unit also hosts seminars, workshops, cultural programmes awareness campaigns, exhibitions. EVIDENCE OF SUCCESS: The cumulative result of all this is the involvement of all our stakeholders in the field of social responsibilities. CHALLENGES: Computer literacy and online access for students are needed to actualize the social goal. More effects to be initiated to motivate students to participate in the NSS activities. 2. THE COLLEGE AS AN EXTENDED PLATFORM GOAL: Our College is constructed as a huge platform for the students to nurture and showcase their skills and talents. It extends to all possible activities right from the communications, debate, confidencebuilding, music, arts, to the sport and games. CONTEXT: This involves the college in the yearlong events that run parallel to the tight academic schedule under the new CBCS programme under the circumstances, the college finds it difficult at times to shuttle back and forth between its academic and extracurricular activities. But we believe that a student has different abilities that need to be attended to. THE PRACTICE: We encourage our students to host various events related to sports, cultural and seasonal festivals, anniversary and commemorative celebration of icons and great men. All these events are entrusted to the NSS, the NCC and the students Union. All senior teachers offer guidance and direction to these units. EVIDENCE OF SUCCESS: All these festivals generate a spirit of participation that reflects back on the overall atmosphere of harmony, peace and freedom. It also acts as an antidote against the narrow politics of the outer world. CHALLENGES: We have to keep a close vigil on the academic activities which cannot be allowed to be hampered. A proper utilization of fund for the events is also to be attended to. 3. LECTURE SERIES FOR STUDENTS GOAL: Each department takes upon itself to introduce its students to a series of lectures delivered by various speakers, resource persons from other colleges. The intention is to expose them to diverse styles of pedagogy. CONTEXT: Students used to the lectures delivered by the same faculty members can experience freshness both in for us and content of regular classteaching. Students as well as teachers benefit from such lecture series. Such lectures cross the narrowly defined boundaries of the given syllabus and give our students taste of interdisciplinary. THE PRACTICE: Each department decides the speaker and the topic to be delivered. The lecture sessions are open to the willing students and faculty members from other departments. Special care is taken to encourage interaction between the speaker and the spoken. The topic, format, and the teaching devices are designed accordingly. EVIDENCE OF SUCCESS: The result is quite encouraging, particularly in view of the presence of students and teachers in such sessions. They are being regularly exposed to the different styles of pedagogy which help them make a comparative evaluation of what is happening at their own institution. CHALLENGES: To accommodate such lecture sessions within the regular schedule already constrained by the new CBCS pressure, is at times difficult. Besides, all the departments going for the lecture series at once, the pressure for the

venue are too high. More such venues are to be opened. 4. CREATING A SCIENTIFIC TEMPERAMENT GOAL: Our college does not mercy address the academic issues from functional and utilitarian perspective our attempt is to create a scientific temperament among students. This involves the production of an empirically oriented questioning mind. THE CONTEXT: It is true that our students come from diverse backgrounds - urban, rural, semirural - with their cultural baggage. This confronts us with the task of creating an environment without superstition, prejudice, bias, bigotry, which our students can breathe and imbibe. THE PRACTICE: With this in view, the college hosts various sciencerelated Exhibitions and Model Competitions for the students to participate and showcase their interest and aptitude. The respective science departments also encourage their students to participate in some such events held at venues other than our college. EVIDENCE OF SUCCESS: Students are found to develop the major skills, such as a sense of proportion, an eye to observe details, a creative faculty required to prepare accurate models during the model making exercise. This helps them to win prizes in different competitions. The group participation helps students in cultivating the team spirit and unity among them. CHALLENGES: The College At Times is constrained for funds to host such events. It is further aggravated by lack of technological support and lack of proper equipment to prepare more sophisticated models. 5. SERIES OF MOTIVATIONAL COUNSELLING WORKSHOPS GOAL: The college, in order to keep our students continually alert, psychologically strong and motivated, arrange a service of workshops aimed at motivational counselling. Such workshops cover personal, academic and career counselling. THE CONTEXT: Many of the students of our college hail from humble background with low confidence and motivational level. This aspect is in need of being urgently addressed. Even during the academic session same problems related to motivation are liable to crop up. THE PRACTICE: An external counsellor or a team of counsellors, in cooperation with the one, in charge of the college's Counselling Cell, conducts such workshops. Students of each department are to join such sessions which finally turn out to be an open discussion followed by interactive sessions. RESULT: Those attending such workshops are found to have a worked improvement in their attendance. They also are keen to share their problems with teachers and accept the latter's' suggestions. CHALLENGES: The primary task for the workshops is to convince students as well as their guardians about the use and effectiveness of such an exercise. The college intends to make use of more specialised areas of counselling which will handle their problems on both micro and macro levels.
