Dr. Zakir Hussain and Child Education in India

A new nation state always demands a new kind of self-projection to secure a place in the international community. This sense came as a natural process in the case of the new nation of India also. The situation was a little different in the case of the new state of India, because it was no longer under the colonial rule but a nation that has now translated into a nation-state. A nascent state requires new idioms of legitimacy and in this situation the anxiety about legitimization for its policies was predictable.

It was the anxiety to legitimize the authority of India and to generate consent for the new legislations. Hence, in every field of national policy making, 'great thinkers' supposedly representing the nation's morality in an essential sense, particularly in the years immediately after Independence.

In the process of making of a nation the child has received an important position to the nation builders. Ideas on rights, education, and welfare of the child and the conception of taking 'child as the future asset of a nation' already existed in that particular age.

The reactions, opinions and thoughts of some thinkers on child, child education, child psychology, and rights of the child bring to us some interesting information. Some of them were highly creative and individualistic in their temperaments, thinking and functioning and some of them could not shed the influence of conservative influence of the time and limitations of patriarchal hierarchical social set up. Some of them were strongly subdued under the notion of patriarchy or the concept of adult hegemony over the child.

In this backdrop, the present article would discuss the thoughts of an exceptional thinker of that age, whose thoughts on child,
